Weekly Writing Tasks	Weekly Maths Tasks
<p>Monday- Write a riddle about a method of transport. A riddle is a type of poem that describes something without actually naming what it is. Remember that when you write a riddle, you are trying to give the reader some clues so that they can guess what method of transport it is. Try not to make the clues too obvious. For example, if you mention wings, it would be obvious that you would be describing an aeroplane. (I will put the riddles on the blog so that you can try guessing each other's riddles).</p> <p>Tuesday- Design your own mode of transport and then get them to create an information leaflet all about it. Ask them to think about how it works, what it looks like and safety procedures whilst on board. What destinations does the vehicle travel to and how long is travel time?</p> <p>Wednesday- Your child can write a job application as someone who would like to work on board this new mode of transportation. Get them to think about the skills they need for the job. Learning Project - to be done throughout the week

- **Is it a Bird? Is it a Plane?-** Choose a major city from each continent and look at the population's primary mode of public transport, e.g. rickshaws and Skytrain in Bangkok, Asia, the Tube in London, Europe etc. Create a fact-sheet showing each city's most popular mode of transport and decide which is their favourite, providing reasons for their opinions.
- **Creativity in the Underground-** Many of the London Underground tube stations have their own unique, [tiled designs](#). Think of your own London Underground tube station name and create a tile design to accompany it. You can draw the design using crayons, felt tips or paint. Alternatively, you may choose to represent the design in the form of a collage, cutting out your own tiles of paper, newspaper, magazines, cardboard, or whatever you have access to at home. 
- **From Horse-Drawn Cart to Jumbo Jet-** Direct your child to select 10 modes of transport from throughout history using this [link](#). Research the modes of transport and present them on a timeline, writing a description for each one, explaining what it was and who would have used it - bonus points for including the inventors!
- **Faster Than a Speeding Bullet...Train-** The Shanghai Maglev, also known as Shanghai Transrapid, is currently the fastest train in the world, running between Shanghai and Beijing in China. Challenge your child to be just as speedy and complete the following 5 activities as fast as possible: Star jumps, tuck jumps, press-ups, squats and lunges. Ask them to record how many repetitions of each activity they can perform in 1 minute. Can they beat their personal best? Challenge them to record their heart rate (beats per minute) after each activity.
